Freshwater Monitoring Course!

Binche Whut'en First Nation is excited to offer a freshwater monitoring course in our community. Up to six participants will be registered and certified in monitoring protocols used by the Canadian Aquatic Biomonitoring Network (CABIN). Course fees will be paid for by BWFN, with training support from Living Lakes Canada, and the Firelight Group.

What is CABIN monitoring?

The CABIN protocol is a nationally recognized method for monitoring the health of streams. CABIN uses information about the water and insect community to assess aquatic ecosystem condition.

Why get certified?

Monitoring helps us track the health of our streams. CABIN certification also makes a great addition to your resume!

How much does it cost?

Nothing! BWFN will cover the cost of your registration (\$250).

Dates and Location:

Certification will take approximately seven days total, including both an online course (July 21-24), and field certification (September 14-17).

The online course will be hosted out of BWFN's band office and field training will take place near the community.

Requirements:

To participate in the training, you must be 18 years of age or older; have access to a laptop or computer for the online course; and be comfortable working in and around streams.
