
#### WELCOME TO THE FIRST EDITION OF

# 1. BINCHE WHUT'EN COMPREHENSIVE COMMUNITY PLAN (CCP)

## What is a Comprehensive Community Plan (CCP)?

A Comprehensive Community Plan (CCP) involves the entire community coming together to share their ideas for a better future and create a plan for how to get there. CCPs involve planning for all aspects of community wellbeing, including the environment, economy, land, culture, people, places, and programs. Binche's CCP will showcase community voices and strengths, creating a roadmap to a healthy, sustainable, and prosperous future.



#### Binche Whut'en's Community Plan will be developed in 3 Phases

#### 2. FRESHWATER STEWARDSHIP PROJECT

Starting summer 2020, Binche Whut'en is kicking off a project to support freshwater monitoring and stewardship in our territory. Project goals include: 1) identifying high priority streams or watersheds for monitoring, protection, and restoration; 2) documenting community knowledge of local stream health and related values, including salmon; and 3) providing training opportunities for community members in freshwater monitoring methods.

As a part of this project, Binche Whut'en is excited to offer a freshwater monitoring course in our community. Up to six participants will be registered and certified in monitoring protocols used by the Canadian Aquatic Biomonitoring Network (CABIN). Course fees will be paid for by Binche Whut'en, with training support from Living Lakes Canada and the Firelight Group.

#### What is CABIN monitoring?

The CABIN protocol is a nationally recognized method for monitoring the health of streams. CABIN uses information about the water and insect community to assess aquatic ecosystem condition. CABIN monitoring can help us track the health of our streams, and certification also makes a great addition to your resume!

#### How can I be involved?

In the coming weeks, we will be reaching out to community members, Elders, and knowledge holders to share their knowledge and vision for the streams and watersheds in our territory. For those interested in contributing to both projects, a single interview for the CCP and Freshwater Stewardship Project can be done together!
